

1926 – ‘THE HOLLOCAUST’ OF THE AMERICAS

- 1926 – Arthur C. Parker, a Seneca Nation citizen wrote “An Analytical History of the Seneca Indians” for the New York State Archeological Association, Rochester, N.Y.
 - Parker used “THE HOLLOCAUST” to refer to the total destruction of Haudenosaunee towns, food supplies, orchards, crops and the loss of Indigenous homelands to white European settler/colonizers.
 - Indigenous Peoples “HOLLOCAUST” OF THE Americas was the term used **20 years before** it was refer to the Jewish Holocaust of World War II.

May 28, 1830 – United States President Andrew Jackson signed the Indian Removal Act that resulted in the genocide of thousands of Indigenous Peoples including one-quarter (1/4) of the Cherokee Nation (Trail of Tears) and the forced removal of over 50,000 Indigenous Peoples from their traditional homelands immediately settled by white European settler/colonizers. To Indigenous Peoples, Jackson is the “Indian Killer” President in American History.
